## **EDUCATION Licensure Notes:**

<sup>1</sup>Alternately may enroll in this course in a subsequent semester (prior to admission to the Teacher Education Program) if necessitated by scheduling constraints.

<sup>2</sup>General Psychology (a required course for admission into the Teacher Education Program) may also be used to satisfy the General Education Disciplinary Elective in the area of Social Science.

<sup>3</sup>All remaining General Education Disciplinary Electives should be carefully selected in order to ensure meeting course requirements in the areas of Natural Science, Humanities, Other Cultures and the Arts.

<sup>4</sup>Refer to Four-Year Plan relative to applicable licensure area for suggested sequence of content area courses. (<u>Note</u>: Some adjustment to prototype format may be necessary due to prerequisites and/or course rotation considerations).

<sup>5</sup>EDUC 216 requires 20 hours of field-based observation in a diverse school setting. This course can be taken any semester prior to student teaching.

<sup>6</sup>Enrollment in this course is open only to those students who have been formally admitted into the Teacher Education Program.

# THEATRE NOTES:

**Goal and Career Development** is a requirement each semester for all declared theatre education majors.

The course serves as the general education requirement for PREP 499.

**Theatre Participation** is required for all students on Theatre Activity Scholarship. This class may be taken for the 17<sup>th</sup> or 18<sup>th</sup> hour of credit at no additional cost to the student. See the ACTIVITY GUIDELINES page for requirements for all students on Theatre Scholarships or involved in productions.

\* Note: Students much complete a Speech and a Theatre "experience checklist" prior to graduation. It is in the best interest of the student to begin working through this checklist as soon as possible. This Checklist requires students in this Emphasis Area to take responsibility in every area of production and activity sponsorship in theatre and speech. Such participation ensures much greater likelihood of success as new teachers go into the high school academic and extracurricular systems.

Teaching and directing theatre and speech are extraordinarily rewarding, but also demanding. Academic loads are not light and production work is demanding, so students wishing to prepare for success in education must develop extraordinary work ethic and discipline in the development of their vocal, physical, mental, and emotional attributes and skills. The development understanding of acting performance, directing, and design and craftsmanship in all technical areas is absolutely necessary for the successful teacher. The courses listed as requirements do not academically cover development of all of the skills. Additional study will be enormously helpful, and successful completion of the theatre "experience checklist" is absolutely a minimal necessity.

Any performance or design/technical theatre classes will help the student be a better director and teacher.

We strongly suggest that during one summer, students do summer theatre, which may be taken for academic credit.

The Southwestern College Theatre Department provides opportunities every year for students to expand their horizons by studying the arts in New York City, in regional theatre cities like Chicago and Minneapolis, or internationally in England, Europe or Asia. Such study is invaluable to studying the theatre and the arts in our world, as well as opportunities for a life and/or career in the arts. Travel opportunities are on scheduled on a four year cycle so students can take as many opportunities as possible, and may get credit for their study.
